THANK YOU. MR. BEDENBAUGH: I AM JODY BEDENBAUGH, OF RICHLAND COUNTY THE PRESIDENT THE BAR ON BEHALF OF THE BAR ASSOCIATION ASSOCIATION. I'D LIKE TO WELCOME YOU AND THANK YOU FOR COMING TO OUR ANNUAL MEMORIAL SERVICE. THE MEMORIAL SERVICE IS A SPECIAL EVENT FOR THE I THINK IT'S RICHLAND COUNTY BAR ASSOCIATION. A UNIQUE EVENT AMONG OUR ASSOCIATION AT A TIME WHEN THE NORMAL WORK OF THE COURT AND THE BAR PAUSES TO FOR JUST A MOMENT REMEMBER THE MEMBERS THAT WE LOST IN THE PAST YEAR. THIS YEAR WE REMEMBER 10 OF OUR MEMBERS WHO PASSED AWAY. THOUGH THEY RANGE FROM A YOUNG LAWYER WHO WAS JUST ENTERING THE PRIME OF HIS CAREER, TO A LAWYER WHO HAD PRACTICED FOR OVER SEVEN DECADES, THEY ALL HAD A SIGNIFICANT IMPACT ON OUR COMMUNITY AND, AS I THINK YOU'LL HEAR FROM THE SPEAKERS, THEY ALL MADE A TREMENDOUS IMPACT

ON THEIR COLLEAGUES AND THEIR FRIENDS IN THE
BAR. SO, AGAIN, THANK YOU FOR COMING.

THE HONORABLE JUDGE LEE: THE FIRST PERSON WE ARE
RECOGNIZING TODAY IS RONALD ALEXANDER AND
REMARKS WILL BE MADE BY ROBERT MCKENZIE.

MR. MCKENZIE: MAY IT PLEASE THE COURT.

THE HONORABLE JUDGE LEE: YES, SIR.

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MR. MCKENZIE: MEMBERS OF THE JUDICIARY, MEMBERS OF THE BAR, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN. RON ALEXANDER LIVED A SHORT 53 YEARS. HE WAS TAKEN FROM US IN THE PRIME OF HIS LIFE BY AN INEXPLICABLE SWIMMING ACCIDENT THAT OCCURRED WHILE HE WAS ON VACATION IN FLORIDA. RON GREW UP IN OCONEE COUNTY, HE HAD HIS EARLY EDUCATION THERE. HE ATTENDED FURMAN UNIVERSITY AND GRADUATED SUMA CUMLAUDE AND HE WAS ALSO ELECTED TO PHI KAPPA. ΗE HAD Α STRONG RECORD AΤ THE UNIVERSITY OF SOUTH CAROLINA LAW SCHOOL. HE WAS A MEMBER OF THE ORDER OF THE WIG AND ROBE. THROUGHOUT HIS LIFE HE WAS BOTH A PROUD PALADIN AND ALSO A SUPPORTER OF THE GAMECOCK ATHLETICS. HIS ACADEMIC ACCOMPLISHMENTS THAT I'VE CITED, I DON'T THINK ADEQUATELY GIVE US A PICTURE OF HIS ACADEMIC PROWESS FOR THIS REASON, RON PROBABLY HAD THE WORST HANDWRITING OF ANYBODY ΙN THE

WORLD. IT WAS THE WORST THAT I'VE EVER SEEN
I'M SURE HIS PROFESSORS WOULD SAY THE SAME
THING. WHEN HE TURNED HIS PAPERS IN IT WOULD
HAVE LOOKED, I'M SURE, LIKE A PRESCRIPTION PAD
DURING AN EPIDEMIC OUTBREAK. AND WHEN YOU
ASKED HIM OR TEASED HIM ABOUT IT, HE HAD ONE
SIMPLE ANSWER AND THAT WAS INCREDULOUS, "YOU
CAN'T READ THAT?" AND WE HAD A SIMPLE NOT
CREDULOUS OR INCREDULOUS ANSWER AND THAT WAS,
"NO." RON WAS ADMITTED TO THE BAR IN 1987.
DURING THE WHOLE TIME THAT HE PRACTICED, HE WAS
HEADQUARTERED IN COLUMBIA AND WAS A MEMBER OF
THIS BAR. AS A MEMBER OF THE BAR, AND AS
DISTINGUISHED FROM SOME SO CALLED LITIGATORS,
RON ACTUALLY TRIED CASES. HE HAD TO HIS CREDIT
OVER 300 JURY VERDICTS. AND IF YOU COUNT THAT
DURING THE TIME THAT HE PRACTICED, IT AVERAGES
OUT TO DOUBLE DIGITS FOR EVERY YEAR THAT HE
PRACTICED. IN MOST INSTANCES HE WAS SUCCESSFUL
FOR HIS CLIENT. HE WAS A MEMBER OF THE
AMERICAN BOARD OF TRIAL ADVOCATES, AN ACRONYM
IS 'ABOTA'. IT'S AN INVITATION ONLY
ORGANIZATION DEDICATED TO THE PRESERVATION OF
THE RIGHT TO TRIAL BY JURY, GUARANTEED BY THE
7TH AMENDMENT OF THE UNITED STATES

CONSTITUTION. IT ALSO PROMOTES STABILITY AMONG
MEMBERS OF THE BAR; IT'S AN ORGANIZATION OF
LAWYERS. I THINK IT IS A SIGNAL ACHIEVEMENT OR
SAYS SOMETHING ABOUT RON THAT UPON HIS DEATH,
THE MEMBERS OF SOUTH CAROLINA 'ABOTA' THAT
CHAPTER, CONTRIBUTED SUFFICIENT FUNDS TO THE
NATIONAL ABOTA FOUNDATION TO MAKE RON
POSTHUMOUSLY A SENIOR LIFE FELLOW OF THE
NATIONAL ABOTA FOUNDATION. HE WAS RATED BY
MARTINDALE-HUBBLE FOR IT'S HIGHEST RATING BOTH
FOR LEGAL ABILITY AND ETHICAL STANDING. LIKE
OTHER MEMBERS OF THE BAR, WHICH WE ARE HONORING
TODAY, RON WAS WELL SUITED TO BE A MEMBER OF
THIS PROFESSION. THOSE QUALITIES THAT HE HAD
AS A LAWYER WERE ALSO THE QUALITIES THAT HE HAD
IN HIS EVERYDAY LIFE. AND IF YOU KNOW LAWYERS
YOU KNOW THAT THERE'S NO DIFFERENCE. RON WAS
A GENTLE MAN, HE WAS KIND, CONSIDERATE OF
OTHERS, SYMPATHETIC ALMOST TO A FAULT. BUT HE
DID HAVE A STRONG SENSE OF WHAT WAS RIGHT AND
HE WOULD ADVOCATE FOR HIS POSITION, EVEN WHEN
IT APPEARED HIS POSITION MIGHT FAIL. HE WAS A
FIERCE ADVOCATE AND SOME WOULD SAY THAT HE WAS
STUBBORN. HE POSSESSED A STRONG AFFINITY FOR
THOSE WHO WERE UNDERDOGS OR LESS FORTUNATE AND

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ATTORNEY FOCUSING HIS PRACTICE ON REPRESENTING
INJURED WORKERS FOR HIS WHOLE CAREER. THAT'S
THE OFFICIAL STUFF, LET'S TALK ABOUT BEAU. TOO
MANY OF US LET BEING A LAWYER DEFINE WHO WE
ARE, BEAU NEVER DID. BEAU WAS THE COOLEST GUY
I EVER KNEW. HE KNEW HOW TO HAVE FUN IN
EVERYTHING HE DID. HE LOVED TO SNOW BOARD,
SKATEBOARD, DRINK BEER WITH HIS BUDDIES, SURF,
HE WAS AN ADRENALINE JUNKIE. BEAU NEVER
MARRIED BUT BEAU LOVED WOMEN AND WOMEN LOVED
BEAU. BEAU DROVE A PORSCHE, BUT NOT BECAUSE OF
STATUS OR PRETENSE, BEAU DROVE A PORSCHE
BECAUSE IT WOULD GO FAST. BEAU LOVED TO TRAVEL
AND HE TRAVELED LIGHT. IF YOU EVER TRAVELED
WITH BEAU, YOU KNEW ALL HE NEEDED WAS A
BACKPACK, A HAMMOCK AND SURF BOARD AND HE WOULD
BE OFF TO SOME BEACH IN PANAMA, NICARAGUA, OR
COSTA RICA. THOSE WERE HIS HAPPY PLACES.
THOSE BEACHES WITH BIG SWELLS WERE WHAT HE
ENJOYED MORE THAN ANYTHING IN LIFE THAT I KNOW
OF. FOLLY BEACH WAS HIS MECCA, DEVINE STREET
WAS HIS KINGDOM. BEAU HAD THE RARE ABILITY TO
BE LIKED BY EVERYONE AND HE LIKED EVERYONE. IN
OUR ADVERSARIAL PROFESSION, THAT SPEAKS VOLUME
ABOUT HIS CHARACTER AND INTEGRITY. IF HE TOLD

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WE'VE ALL BEEN SADDENED BY HIS PASSING BUT JUS:
ABOUT EVERY DAY WE SEE, HEAR, DO OR SAY
SOMETHING THAT REMINDS US OF BEAU AND WE SMILE
IN THE LARGE CONFERENCE ROOM IN OUR OFFICE
HANGS A VERY LARGE FRAMED PHOTO OF BEAU. THE
INSCRIPTION UNDER IT SAYS, "LAWYER DUDE." THAT
WAS BEAU. IF BEAU WERE WITH US TODAY, I THINK
HE WOULD SHARE THESE THOUGHTS, "LIFE IS SHORT,
LIVE IT TO THE FULLEST. RESPECT EVERYONE
WHEN YOU HAVE A JOB, DO IT WELL AND THEN GO
HAVE FUN." WILLIAM BEAU BUSCH, RICHLAND COUNTY
BAR MEMBER, FRIEND TO EVERYONE AND THE COOLEST
GUY I EVER KNEW. THANK YOU, YOUR HONOR, FOR
LETTING ME SPEAK ABOUT MY FRIEND.

THE HONORABLE JUDGE LEE: THANK YOU, VERY MUCH, MR.

SMITH. NEXT WE WILL RECOGNIZE BARBARA COOPER

SPEAKING ON BEHALF OF DAVID COOPER.

MS. COOPER: MAY IT PLEASE THE COURT.

THE HONORABLE JUDGE LEE: YES, MA'AM.

MS. COOPER: I'M HONORED TO SPEAK TODAY ON BEHALF OF
A MAN THAT I CONSIDER TO HAVE BEEN ONE OF THE
MOST HONORABLE ATTORNEYS THAT I HAVE EVER
KNOWN. I'M SPEAKING ABOUT MY FATHER, DAVID
JACKSON COOPER, JR. HE WAS BORN IN HENDERSON,
NORTH CAROLINA IN 1940 AND IN THE EARLY YEARS

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MILITARY, UNTIL 2000 WHEN HE RETIRED FROM THE
JAG CORP WITH THE RANK OF CAPTAIN. HIS
CIVILIAN PRACTICE OF LAW WAS DIVERSE AND HE
HELD SEVERAL DIFFERENT POSITIONS THROUGHOUT HIS
LIFETIME. IN ADDITION TO PRIVATE PRACTICE, HE
SERVED AS AN ATTORNEY FOR THE SOUTH CAROLINA
DEPARTMENT OF MENTAL HEALTH, THE 5TH CIRCUIT
SOLICITOR'S OFFICE, THE SOUTH CAROLINA WORKER'S
COMPENSATION FUND, AND AS COUNSEL AND DIRECTOR
OF RESEARCH FOR THE JUDICIARY COMMITTEE OF THE
SOUTH CAROLINA HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. HE
RETIRED IN 2003 AS AN ATTORNEY AND DIRECTOR OF
RESEARCH FOR THE LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL OF THE
SOUTH CAROLINA GENERAL ASSEMBLY. THAT
RETIREMENT, HOWEVER, WAS SHORT LIVED. HE WENT
BACK TO WORK FOR A MILITARY DEFENSE CONTRACTOR
AND WAS DEPLOYED TO AFGHANISTAN IN 2004 AND
2005. DURING HIS TIME THERE HE SERVED AS A
MILITARY LAW EXPERT AND HE WAS INSTRUMENTAL IN
THE DEVELOPMENT OF PREVIOUSLY NONEXISTENT
MILITARY LAW FOR THE AFGHAN MINISTRY OF
DEFENSE. HE WAS A DEVOTED EPISCOPALIAN AND HE
DUTIFUL SERVED IN CHURCH THROUGHOUT HIS ENTIRE
LIFE. AS A TEENAGER HE SERVED AS AN ACOLYTE
NEARLY EVERY SUNDAY. IN HIS LATER YEARS HE

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SERVED AS THE ACOLYTE MASTER, HE WAS A MEMBER VESTRY AND WAS Α LAYTHE READER AND Α CHALICE BEARER AT ST. JOHN'S IN SHANDON. MY FATHER MET MY MOTHER, BARBARA EICHELBERGER OF CLINTON AND MARRIED HER IN 1971. TOGETHER THEY HAD THREE CHILDREN, MYSELF, AND MY TWO YOUNGER SISTERS, ELIZABETH AND MARY HARDY. I HAVE VERY EARLY MEMORIES, BEFORE THEY WERE BORN, OF SITTING AΤ THE COUNSEL TABLE ΙN THE OLD COURTHOUSE WHILE HE ARGUED TO THE JURY. Ι COULDN'T HAVE BEEN ANYMORE THAN FIVE OR SIX YEARS OLD AND I REMEMBER RIGHT IN THE MIDDLE OF TRIAL, GETTING UP TO GO TO THE VENDING MACHINE OR THE WATER FOUNTAIN WITHOUT ANY HESITATION. AS AN ATTORNEY MYSELF NOW, I THINK THAT THAT VERY BRAVE OF WAS HIM TO HAVE TAKEN COURT. HE ALWAYS SAID THAT HE WON JURY TRIALS WHEN HE TOOK ME THOUGH. MY FATHER WAS MY HERO AND HE WAS ONE OF THE SMARTEST PEOPLE THAT I'VE EVER MET. HE HAD THE UNCANNY ABILITY TΟ OVERCOME THE MOST DIFFICULT OBSTACLES AND MAKE THE RIGHT THINGS HAPPEN. NO MATTER WHAT IT WAS HIS INTEGRITY WAS ABOVE REPROACH. ΗE NEVER TOLD A LIE, HE NEVER CUT CORNERS AND HE DID NOT CARE MUCH FOR PEOPLE WHO DID. MY

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VERY FATHER HAD HIGH STANDARDS AND IN COMPARISON TO THE PARENTS OF MY CHILDHOOD FRIENDS, HE SEEMED VERY STRICT. HE ACCEPTED NO EXCUSES AND NOTHING LESS THAN EXCELLENCE FROM HIMSELF AND FROM OTHERS. HE WAS A DEDICATED PROFESSIONAL AND WITHOUT A DOUBT I CAN SAY HE WAS HIGHLY RESPECTED FOR HIS INTEGRITY AND HIS STERLING PERSONAL CHARACTER, HIS TENACITY AND HIS TREMENDOUS WORK ETHIC. THE MOST IMPORTANT THING I CAN SAY ABOUT MY FATHER TODAY IS THAT TRULY BELIEVE HE WAS THE BEST DADDY. HE ATTENDED MY LAW SCHOOL GRADUATION WITH ONE OF I'M THANKFUL MY BABY SHOES IN HIS COAT POCKET. FOR THE ROLE MODEL THAT HE WAS AND MY SISTERS ARE VERY LUCKY TO HAVE SUCH AND Ι HADΑN AMAZING MAN AS OUR FATHER. I AM AND ALWAYS WILL BE VERY PROUD OF HIM AND I THANK YOU FOR ALLOWING ME TO HONOR HIS MEMORY HERE TODAY.

MR. LACY: MAY IT PLEASE THE COURT.

THE HONORABLE JUDGE LEE: YES, SIR.

MR. LACY: MEMBERS OF THE JUDICIARY, MEMBERS OF THE

BAR, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN. TODAY WE TAKE A FEW

MINUTES TO REMEMBER LEO DRYER. HE CAME TO
CAROLINA IN THE FALL OF '71. ALL COULD TELL
THE HE WAS UNIQUE, AS SOON AS CLASSES HAD
BEGUN. HE RODE A BIG OLD CYCLE, A COMPLETELY
UNIQUE MOTOR CRAFT. A BMW R50, WITH A FULLY
ENCLOSED DRIVE SHAFT. HE WAS THE ONLY PERSON
WHO HAD ONE, WHICH MAD HIM A SPECIAL EGG. AND
SIX MONTHS LATER HE WAS THE ONLY STUDENT, WHO
SPORTED A BROKEN LEG. NOW, I CAN'T SAY SCHOOL
WAS A SNAP, OR WHAT MAJOR WAS HIS CHOICE, BUT
LEO HAD A GOD-GIVEN GIFT, AN INCREDIBLE SINGING
VOICE. HE WAS A TENOR EXTRAODINAIRE AND
SOMETIMES HE SANG BASS. BUT WHEN HE SANG "OH
DANNY BOY" TEARS RAN DOWN YOUR FACE. LEO SANG
AT ST. JOSEPH'S CHURCH, USUALLY AS A CHOIR
MEMBER. BUT SOMETIMES HE WOULD SOLO, AN EVENT
WE ALL WOULD REMEMBER. ARPAD DURAGE HEARD HIM
SING AND OFFERED A DEAL SO COOL, YOU SING FOR
ME IN MY USC CHOIR, I'LL PAY YOUR WAY THROUGH
LAW SCHOOL. LEO WAS REMEMBERED AS THE ONE EVER
KNOWN TO BE, THE GUY WITH A UNIQUE SINGING
TALENT, WHO SANG FOR HIS JD DEGREE. TIMESWERE
TOUGH IN '74, WHEN GRADUATION CAME. RECESSION
GRIPPED THE ECONOMY AND EVERY JOB OFFER WAS
LAME. LEO TOOK A POSITION WITH ATTORNEY J.

WELSEY DRAWDY, COLLECTING DEBTS FOR COMMERCIAL
LENDERS AND JUDGEMENTS SET BY DECREE. LEO DID
HIS JOB SO WELL, HE BECAME A STAR NO DOUBT. J.
WELSEY APPARENTLY FELT THREATENED AND ONE DAY
LOCKED HIM OUT. UNDAUNTED BY THE SETBACK, LEO
TOOK WHAT HE HAD LEARNED, WENT ACROSS THE RIVER
AND STARRED HIS OWN FIRM. HE CULTIVATED
CLIENTS, AND HIS PRACTICE WOULD EXPAND. IF YOU
NEEDED A DEBT COLLECTED, LEO WAS YOUR MAN. AS
HE ENDURED THESE TRIALS, FATE GAVE LEO A SHOVE.
LEO MET PEGGY BELCHER AND LEO FELL IN LOVE.
PEGGY HAD THREE SONS, DAVID, MARK AND SHAWN.
THEY WELCOMED LEO INTO THEIR LIVES AND HE
TREATED THEM AS HIS OWN. PEGGY MARRIED LEO AND
SETTLED INTO FAMILY LIFE. LEO THE LOVING
HUSBAND, PEGGY THE ADORING WIFE. THIS MIGHT BE
A GOOD PLACE TO STOP BUT THERE'S SO MUCH MORE
TO TELL, LIKE LEO'S LOVE OF VINTAGE CARS AND
HOW HE SHARED HIS CLIENTELE. HE LOVED OLD
CARS, RATHER THE ENGINE RAN OR NOT. HE KEPT
HIS GARAGE IN CAYCE FULL OF EVERY CAR HE GOT.
AT ONE TIME HE HAD TEN, BUT ONLY TWO WOULD
START, A FIFTY-SIX WHITE T-BIRD AND A SIXTY-
FIVE SUPER SPORT. PERHAPS THE MOST AMAZING
TRAIT I HAVE NOT DESCRIBED THUS FAR, WAS HIS

AMAZING GENEROSITY TO OTHER MEMBERS OF THE BAR.
MOST LAWYERS GUARD THEIR CLIENTS LIKE SHEEP
DOGS GUARD THEIR SHEEP. BUT LEO NEVER THOUGHT
A CLIENT WAS PROPERTY HE COULD KEEP. ONE TIME
ANOTHER LAWYER MET THE SAME FATE AS LEO SAW.
THE GUY WAS KICKED OUT OF A FIRM AND LEFT ALONE
TO PRACTICE LAW. LEO DIDN'T JUST CONSOLE HIM
AND LECTURE SELF-RELIANCE, LEO TOOK THE GUY TO
NEW YORK AND INTRODUCED HIM TO HIS CLIENTS.
LEO'S LIFE WAS FULL OF LAUGHTER, WARMTH AND
LOVE. THE FAMILY HE MERGED INTO FIT LEO LIKE
A GLOVE. THE BOYS ALL WENT TO COLLEGE AND ALL
EARNED THEIR DEGREES. ALL OF THEM ARE MARRIED
AND ALL HAVE FAMILIES. LIFE WAS TRULY
WONDERFUL, 'TIL CANCER CAME ALONG. LEO KNEW
THE TIME WAS NIGH WHEN HE'D BE SINGING HIS LAST
SONG. HE REFUSED TO ACKNOWLEDGE CANCER BY
CALLING IT BY NAME. "I'VE GOT TERMITES, "HE'D
SAY, BUT THE RESULT WAS CERTAINLY THE SAME.
LEO DIED IN SEPTEMBER, AT THE AGE OF 73. HIS
VOICE IS STILLED BUT HE SINGS ON IN OUR
SWEETEST MEMORY.

THE HONORABLE JUDGE LEE: THANK YOU, MR. LACY. NEXT

WE WILL REMEMBER JAMES HENRY FOWLES, JR. BY

JAMES FOWLES.

MR. FOWLES: THANK YOU, YOUR HONOR. MAY IT PLEASE THE COURT.

THE HONORABLE JUDGE LEE: YES, SIR.

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MR. FOWLES: JAMES HENRY FOWLES, JR., "JIMMY" TO HIS CHILDHOOD FRIENDS AND "JIM" TO THE GROWN UP WORLD AND "DAD" TO ME, WAS BORN IN SEPTEMBER OF 1936 IN COLUMBIA, SOUTH CAROLINA AND DIED THIS EXCEPT FOR TIME IN THE ARMY AND PAST AUGUST. A LATE CAREER JOB OUT OF STATE AND OF COURSE THE VACATION TIME THAT HE COULD FIND, DAD SPENT HIS ENTIRE LIFE IN RICHLAND COUNTY. THE FOWLES ROOTS RUN DEEP ΙN RICHLAND COUNTY. DAD'S ANOTHER JAMES GRANDFATHER, YET HENRY, WAS A MAGISTRATE JUDGE ΙN THIS COUNTY AND LATER THE SERVED AS THE CLERK OF STATE SENATE. GROWING UP IN THE SECOND WORLD WAR, MANY OF MY DAD'S FAVORITE MEMORIES WERE SPENDING TIME WITH HIS GRANDPARENTS OUT ON THE FAMILY PROPERTY IN EASTOVER. I THINK THAT WAS IN LIEU OF JUVENILE SCHOOL FOR DAD BECAUSE THE FAMILY RUMOR IS THAT HE WAS A LITTLE BIT HARD FOR MY GRANDMOTHER, WHO HAD POLIO, TO HANDLE. SO AS THE FAMILY STORY WENT ON, MY GREAT GRANDFATHER, UNCLE LOVIC THOMAS, SUCCEEDED MY GREAT GRANDFATHER AS THE CLERK OF THE SENATE AND HE SAVED MY DAD.

THE WAY HE SAVED MY DAD WAS AS FOLLOWS: YOU
SEE MY DAD'S EARLY ACADEMIC CAREER WAS SOMEWHAT
LESS MOTIVATIONAL THAN MOST TEACHERS AND
PRINCIPALS AND PEOPLE LIKE THAT WOULD LIKE.
MANY OF YOU IN THIS ROOM MAY REMEMBER MR. ARLIE
WHITTINGHILL, WHO HAD BEEN THE PRINCIPAL AT
OR THE ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL AT DREHER WHEN DAD
WAS THERE. AND MR. WHITTINGHILL WAS ABOUT TO
SUGGEST THAT MY DAD EXPLORE NON-ACADEMIC
OPPORTUNITIES. AND BUT UNCLE LOVIC BEAT MR.
WHITTINGHILL TO THE PUNCH AND SAID, JIMMY, YOU
BETTER JOIN THE ARMY. AND DAD DID. AND THIS
IS ONE OF THE STORIES THAT I CAN PROVIDE
PERSONAL, ALBEIT CIRCUMSTANTIAL, EVIDENCE THAT
IT'S TRUE BECAUSE WHEN I WAS AT A.C. FLORA, MR.
WHITTIINGHILL WAS THE PRINCIPAL. AND MR.
WHITTINGHILL NEEDED TO EXERCISE SOME COERCION
OVER THE NEXT GENERATION OF FOWLES'. AND I
WALKED INTO HIS OFFICE AND IMMEDIATELY IN A
VERY LOUD VOICE HE SAID, "FOWLES, I'VE HAD MORE
THAN ENOUGH TROUBLE WITH YOUR DAD AT DREHER,
THAT IS NOT, I REPEAT, NOT GOING TO HAPPEN HERE
AT A.C. FLORA." AFTER THE ARMY, DAD STARTED
HIS UNIVERSITY OF THE SOUTH CAROLINA CAREER AND
AT THAT TIME, I TELL YOU, HE DID HAVE BETTER

	MOTIVATION. AND AT THAT TIME HE MET MOM AND I
	THINK THAT THAT HAD A WHOLE LOT TO DO WITH IT.
	BUT DAD CONTINUED WITH A TREND, HE NEVER DID
	RECEIVE A DEGREE FROM DREHER AND HE NEVER DID
I	RECEIVE AN UNDERGRADUATE DEGREE FROM THE
	UNIVERSITY OF SOUTH CAROLINA. BUT THEY WERE
	TAKING PEOPLE AT THE LAW SCHOOL. AND SO WHEN
	THEY OFFERED HIM THE CHANCE TO START WITHOUT
	FINISHING, DAD WAS VERY MOTIVATED AND JUMPED ON
	IT AND STARTED LAW SCHOOL. DAD WAS ALWAYS
	VERY, VERY PROUD OF HIS LAW SCHOOL CLASS BACK
	IN THE EARLY '60'S. HE SAID ONCE, AND I
	REMEMBER THIS VERY CLEARLY, HE WAS SMOKING HIS
	PIPE AT THE TIME AND TOOK IT OUT AND HE SAID,
	"WHO ELSE COULD BOAST OF AN ALEX SANDERS, A
	WESTON ADAMS AND A CHARLIE WAY?" AND THEN DAD
	PUT THE PIPE BACK IN FOR DRAMATIC AFFECT I
	BELIEVE, AND HE WAITED A FEW SECONDS. AND THEN
	HE TOOK IT OUT AND SAID, "AND A JOHN JENRETTE?"
	AND SO OTHER THAN THAT, I NEVER ASKED DAD TOO
	MUCH, I NEVER ASKED HIM TOO MUCH ABOUT HIS LAW
	SCHOOL CAREER BECAUSE I WAS BORN RIGHT IN THE
	MIDDLE OF HIS FIRST SET OF EXAMS. AND HE NEVER
	FORGAVE ME, NEVER FORGAVE ME. DAD ABSOLUTELY
	LOVED HIS LEGAL CAREER AND I THINK THAT HIS

	LOVE FOR BEING A LAWYER IS WHY I'M ONE TODAY.
	HE TOLD ME ONCE, HE SAID AND Y'ALL FORGIVE
	ME. HE LOOKED FORWARD EVERY DAY GOING TO WORK,
	EVERY DAY AS A LAWYER. AND HE STARTED OFF WITH
	CLARKSON AND MCCANTS. CLARKSON BEING RELATED
	TO THE FOWLES, IF YOU'RE FROM RICHLAND COUNTY
	YOU KNOW THAT. AND AFTER ABOUT SIX YEARS HE
	BECAME THE ASSISTANT DISTRICT ATTORNEY, FEDERAL
	DISTRICT ATTORNEY. AND AT THAT TIME, AFTER
	ABOUT A YEAR, I THINK WELL STROM THURMOND
-	DECIDED, WELL, WE NEED MORE REPUBLICANS IN THAT
	OFFICE. DAD VERY QUICKLY HAD TO GO LOOK FOR
	ANOTHER JOB. AND SO THAT'S WHAT HAPPENED WITH
	HIS DISTRICT ATTORNEY CAREER. AT THAT POINT HE
	STARTED AS CORPORATE COUNSEL. AND HE FIRST WAS
	THE ASSISTANT GENERAL COUNSEL AT THE POWER
	COMPANY, SCE&G. AND THEN HE WENT AND FINISHED
1	UP IS PRIMARY CORPORATE CAREER AND RETIRING
	FROM THE LAND BANK AS GENERAL COUNSEL AND VICE
	PRESIDENT. NOW, DAD DIDN'T WASN'T
	COMPLETELY DONE YET THOUGH. HE WAS OFFERED A
	JOB AND TOOK IT OUT IN MISSISSIPPI FOR SOME
	CONTRACT LEGAL WORK. AND IT WAS RELATED TO HIS
	WORK AT THE LAND BANK AND AFTER CLOSING OUT
	WHAT HE USED TO CALL BAD MISSISSIPPI LOANS, HE

MOVED AND WAS DOING IT FOR THE LAND BANK OF
TEXAS. HE DAD CAME ON BACK HOME, HE CAME ON
BACK TO SOUTH CAROLINA AND IN RICHLAND COUNTY.
BUT INSTEAD OF PUTTING UP HIS SPURS, AND BEING
THE CAROLINA FAN THAT HE WAS, YOU KNOW WHAT
KIND OF TYPE OF SPURS I'M TALKING ABOUT, I
THINK DAD HAD THE MOST GRATIFYING TIME OF HIS
CAREER, HE JUST PUT UP A SHINGLE. HE PUT UP A
SHINGLE, AND UNTIL HE FINALLY RETIRED, HE
PRACTICED WHAT HE WOULD CALL STREET LAW. AND
THAT WAS HIS TERM AND HE WOULD SAY, HE WOULD
HELP HOWEVER HE COULD WHOEVER WALKED IN OFF THE
STREET. AND I REMEMBER HIM SAYING ONE THING
ABOUT THAT WAS, "I MAY NOT BE THE BEST LAWYER
THEY MAY GET BUT NO ONE IS GOING TO ENJOY
HELPING THEM AS MUCH AS I AM." AND HE REALLY
MEANT THAT. I'D BE REMISS IF I DIDN'T SAY TWO
LAST THINGS ABOUT DAD. HE WAS A MAN THAT
DEFINITELY LOVED HIS CHURCH, IN THE EPISCOPAL
CHURCH. I WAS RAISED THAT WAY. I NOW GO TO A
PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, HE NEVER FORGAVE ME FOR
THAT EITHER. BUT THE FAMILY, FAMILY MEANT
EVERYTHING TO HIM, FAMILY MEANT EVERYTHING TO
DAD, HE LOVED IT. ESPECIALLY, AND I THINK MOST
ESPECIALLY ALL OF HIS GRAND KIDS, ALL TEN OF

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THEM. AND OF COURSE, DAD WAS OLD SCHOOL AND SO YOU HAVE TO FORGIVE HIM. HE WOULD OFTEN MAKE GENDER SPECIFIC DISTINCTIONS AMONG HIS GRAND KIDS AND HE WOULD SAY -- AND HE WOULD TELL IT TO ANYBODY, EVEN IF HE DIDN'T KNOW YOU HE WOULD TELL YOU. AND HE WOULD SAY, "LISTEN, I HAVE WONDERFUL GRANDDAUGHTERS AND ALIEN CHILDREN. AND OF COURSE, HE WAS TALKING ABOUT MY SONS AND NOW DAD'S TUNE CHANGED A LITTLE MY NEPHEWS. BIT VERY LATE IN HIS LIFE WHEN DAD HAD A GREAT GRANDSON BORN, MY GRANDSON. YOU CAN GUESS THE NAME, ANOTHER JAMES HENRY FOWLES ARRIVED. AND EVERY TIME MY DAD SAW JAMES HENRY, HE SAID, HE WAS LOOKING INTO THE FUTURE. AND HE MEANT IT. THANK YOU, YOUR HONOR.

THE HONORABLE JUDGE LEE: NEXT WE HAVE A TRIBUTE TO
HERBERT WELLINGTON HOEFER, JR. BY THE HONORABLE
CHIEF JUSTICE JEAN H. TOAL.

THE HONORABLE JEAN TOAL: MAY IT PLEASE THE COURT.

THE HONORABLE JUDGE LEE: YES, MA'AM.

MR. HONORABLE JEAN TOAL: COMMANDER HERBERT WELLING HOEFER, JR. DIED AT PEACE SURROUNDED BY HIS FAMILY ON SATURDAY EVENING, NOVEMBER THE 14TH, 2015. HIS ROSARY AND HIS FUNERAL MASS WAS CELEBRATED AT ST. JOSEPH'S CATHOLIC CHURCH IN

COLUMBIA, IN WHICH HE WAS BAPTIZED AND RAISED AND A LOYAL MEMBER FOR HIS ENTIRE LIFE. HIS REMAINS WERE BURIED AT SEA AT A LATITUDE AND LONGITUDE OF HIS FINAL RESTING POSTED IN A MARKER, WHICH MEMORIALIZES HIS LIFE AT THE SIDE OF OUR MOTHER AND FATHER, IN THE GRAVEYARD OF OUR LADY OF THE HILLS, IN COLUMBIA. BORN IN COLUMBIA, JUNE THE 22ND, 1951, COMMANDER HOEFER WAS THE SON OF THE LATE HERBERT WELLINGTON HOEFER AND LILLA FARRELL HOEFER. HE WAS THE GRANDSON OF FREDERICK AUGUSTUS HOEFER AND SCHMIDT HOEFER OF COLUMBIA AND SOPHIE JAMES EDWARD FARRELL AND JEAN MCCALLUM FARRELL OF ATLANTA. HEWAS EDUCATED ΑТ GEORGETOWN PREPARATORY SCHOOL AND DREHER HIGH SCHOOL. ΙN 1974, HE RECEIVED HIS B.A. DEGREE FROM THE CITADEL, WHERE HE WAS A MEMBER OF THE SUMMERALL GUARDS, ACCLAIMED FOR ITS HIGH PRUSSIAN STEP AND GERMAN CLOSE ORDER DRILL, KNOWN AS THE "CITADEL SERIES" WHICH HE WAS ABLE TO PERFORM UPON GRADUATION, HE WAS COMMISSIONED AS AN OFFICER IN THE UNITED STATES NAVY AND SEVERAL LENGTHY TOURS ON ACTIVE DUTY ON THE USS SARATOGA. FOLLOWING ACTIVE DUTY HE SERVED IN THE U.S. NAVAL RESERVE UNIT HERE IN COLUMBIA

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UNTIL HIS RETIREMENT. HE WAS RECALLED TO
ACTIVE DUTY PILOTING REFLAGGED TANKERS THROUGH
THE PERSIAN GULF DURING THE PERSIAN GULF CRISIS
OF 1986-1989. HE WAS A BROKER FOR THOMAS
JENKINS REALTY AND SERVED AS AN INVESTIGATOR
HERE IN THE 5TH CIRCUIT IN THE SOLICITOR'S
OFFICE. BUT UPON HIS RETURN FROM THE PERSIAN
GULF, HE ENTERED THE UNIVERSITY OF SOUTH
CAROLINA SCHOOL OF LAW AND RECEIVED HIS J.D. IN
1993. HE WAS A MEMBER OF THE SOUTH CAROLINA,
RICHLAND COUNTY, CHARLESTON COUNTY, AND THE
UNITED STATES MILITARY COURT OF APPEALS BARS.
HE PRACTICED LAW WITH ATTORNEY JACK SWERLING,
WITH THE SOUTH CAROLINA DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL
SERVICES OFFICE OF CHILD SUPPORT, AND THE 9TH
CIRCUIT PUBLIC DEFENDER'S OFFICE. EARLY IN HIS
LAW CAREER, HERBERT DEVELOPED AN ABIDING
PASSION FOR THE PRACTICE OF CRIMINAL LEGAL
DEFENSE AND FOR REPRESENTING THE MARGINALIZED
IN OUR SOCIETY. HE HAD THE GREAT GOOD FORTUNE
TO BEGIN PRACTICE WITH ONE OF SOUTH CAROLINA'S
MOST TENACIOUS AND DECENT CRIMINAL LAW EXPERTS,
JACK SWERLING, OF THIS BAR. JACK TAUGHT HERB
TO LIVE BY THE OATH WE TAKE AS LAWYERS: "I
WILL MAINTAIN THE RESPECT DUE TO COURTS OF

JUSTICE AND JUDICIAL OFFICERS; I WILL ABSTAIN
FROM ALL OFFENSIVE PERSONALITIES; I WILL NEVER
REJECT, FROM ANY CONSIDERATION PERSONAL TO
MYSELF, THE CAUSE OF THE DEFENSELESS OR
OPPRESSED." DURING HIS LENGTHY CAREER WITH THE
9TH CIRCUIT PUBLIC DEFENDER, HERBERT TRIED MANY
CASES IN CIRCUIT COURT AND DEVELOPED A
SPECIALITY IN REPRESENTING PUBLIC DEFENDED
CLIENTS IN BOND COURTS, A PROGRAM DEVELOPED IN
THE 9TH CIRCUIT TO AVOID JAIL OVERCROWDING AND
TO ALLOW ELIGIBLE DEFENDANTS TO RETAIN THEIR
EMPLOYMENT WHILE AWAITING TRIAL. THE
CHARLESTON POST COURIER DID A BEAUTIFUL LENGTHY
FEATURE ARTICLE ON HERBERT'S BOND COURT WORK
ENTITLED, "THE BUSIEST LAWYER IN TOWN." AND
THE REPORTER TRAVELED HUNDREDS OF MILES WITH
HERB TO EVERY MAGISTRATE AND CIRCUIT COURT IN
CHARLESTON AND BERKELEY COUNTY. HERB WAS ABLE
TO RESOLVE MANY CASES AT THE EARLIEST TIME BY
VIGOROUS REPRESENTATION OF HIS CLIENTS DURING
PRETRIAL HEARINGS. HERB'S WONDERFUL QUIRKY
SENSE OF HUMOR AND DELIGHT IN THE ABSURD OF
LIFE WAS A JOY TO ALL WHO KNEW HIM. AT HIS
PALLBEARER'S LUNCHEON AFTER HIS FUNERAL AT MY
HOME, A LARGE GATHERING OF HIS CITADEL

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ASSOCIATION IS NOW OVER 16 PROUD SIBLINGS AND COUSINS. AND WITH HERB'S DEATH WE HAVE LOST OUR FIRST MEMBER. SHAKESPEARE PENS THIS FAREWELL TO MY BELOVED BROTHER, "NOW CRACKS A NOBLE HEART, GOODNIGHT SWEET PRINCE AND FLIGHTS OF ANGELS SING THEE TO THY REST." THANK YOU.

THE HONORABLE JUDGE LEE: NEXT WE WILL REMEMBER

JAMES LEVENTIS BY THE HONORABLE ROBERT COBLE

FROM COLUMBIA.

THE HONORABLE ROBERT D. COBLE: MAY IT PLEASE THE COURT.

THE HONORABLE JUDGE LEE: YES, SIR.

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THE HONORABLE ROBERT D. COBLE: OUR CITY AND STATE LOST A GREAT MAN WITH THE PASSING OF JIM HE WAS A LEADER IN EVERY ASPECT OF LEVENTIS. HIS LIFE FOR THE GOOD OF OUR COMMUNITY. JIM MADE A PROFOUND DIFFERENCE IN EVERYTHING HE DID FROM STUDENT BODY PRESIDENT AT DREHER HIGH SCHOOL, GOVERNOR OF BOYS STATE, STUDENT BODY PRESIDENT AT THE UNIVERSITY OF SOUTH CAROLINA, THE RICHLAND COUNTY COUNCIL AND RICHLAND TO SCHOOL DISTRICT ONE, TO HIS LEGAL AND BANKING CAREER, TO HIS TIRELESS CIVIC AND CHURCH WORK, AND ESPECIALLY TO HIS DEVOTION TO HIS FAMILY. HIS WIFE LAURA, WHO IS HERE, HIS SON JAMES AND

HIS WIFE, SISTER TRULA AND BROTHER-IN-LAW JOHN.
I FIRST KNEW OF JIM LEVENTIS AS A FRESHMAN WHEN
I WAS A FRESHMAN AT DREHER HIGH SCHOOL. JIM
HAD BEEN, AS I SAID, STUDENT BODY PRESIDENT AND
HIS PICTURE HUNG IN THE HALL OUTSIDE THE
AUDITORIUM. THE TEACHERS STILL THEN IN THE
LATE 1960'S, TALKED ABOUT JIM LEVENTIS THEN
WHAT A LEADER HE WAS. THE 1970 BOYS STATE WAS
DEDICATED TO JIM'S BROTHER CHRIS WHO PASSES
AWAY AT AN EARLY AGE. BOTH JIM AND CHRIS HAD
BEEN BOYS STATE GOVERNORS. I MET LEIGH
LEVENTIS THERE THAT YEAR AND LEARNED OF THE
TREMENDOUS PUBLIC SERVICE OF THE LEVENTIS
FAMILY. LATER I ROOMED WITH LEIGH IN LAW
SCHOOL. LEIGH INVITED ME TO HEAR JIM SPEAK AT
A BREAKFAST AT THE OLD MARKET RESTAURANT WHEN
JIM WAS RUNNING FOR RICHLAND COUNTY COUNCIL.
AFTER JIM SPOKE, I REMEMBER THINKING, "NOW THAT
IS WHO I WANT TO BE LIKE, BOTH AS A LAWYER AND
ELECTED OFFICIAL." JIM TOOK A LEADERSHIP ROLE
IN MANY AREAS, BUT I BELIEVE HE HAD THREE
ACCOMPLISHMENTS THAT WILL LEAVE A PERMANENT
IMPRINT ON OUR CITY, STATE AND COUNTRY. FIRST,
WITH THE ADVENT OF HOME RULE, LEGISLATION
DRAFTED BY CHIEF TOAL, JIM WAS ELECTED WITH A

LARGE NEW CLASS IN 1976 TO THE RICHLAND COUNTY
COUNCIL AND JUDGE BARBER WAS A MEMBER OF THAT
CLASS. JIM LATER SERVED AS CHAIRMAN. HE
WORKED TIRELESSLY TO BRING OUR VERY DIVERSE
COUNTY TOGETHER AND TO NAVIGATE THE CHANGE IN
LOCAL GOVERNMENT LAWS AND RESPONSIBILITIES. HE
AND OTHER MEMBERS LAID THE GROUNDWORK FOR A
MODERN COUNTY GOVERNMENT. SECONDLY, JIM
CHAIRED THE CENTRAL MIDLANDS REGIONAL PLANNING
COUNCIL IN 1984 AND WAS A LEADER IN REGIONAL
COOPERATION. REGIONAL COOPERATION AND
PROJECTS, WHETHER IT WAS THE COLUMBIA
METROPOLITAN AIRPORT, THE RIVERBANKS ZOO, THE
THREE RIVERS GREENWAY OR THE COLUMBIA
CONVENTION CENTER, HAVE TRANSFORMED OUR
COMMUNITY. FROM MY TIME AS MAYOR NO ONE WAS
MORE DEDICATED AND CONTRIBUTED MORE TO OUR
REGIONAL PROJECTS THAN JIM LEVENTIS. FINALLY,
IN 2002 JIM WAS THE DRIVING FORCE BEHIND
CREATING SOUTH CAROLINA'S FIRST BUSINESS
IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT. THE CITY CENTER
PARTNERSHIP WAS FORMED TO MANAGE COLUMBIA'S
DONWTOWN. AND THROUGH HIS VISION AND
LEADERSHIP OUR DOWNTOWN AND MAIN STREET HAVE
BLOSSOMED AND GROWN. SINCE THE COLUMBIA BID

WAS FORMED IN 2002, THREE NEW OFFICE TOWERS
HAVE BEEN CONSTRUCTED, TWO NEW HOTELS HAVE BEEN
DEVELOPED, PARKING AND RETAIL RETAIL IS
COMING BACK TO MAIN STREET. WALK DOWN MAIN
STREET TOWARD THE CAPITAL WHEN YOU LEAVE HERE
AND YOU WILL SEE HIM'S MARK ON EVERY BLOCK. ON
A PERSONAL NOTE, WHEN I WAS MAYOR I CALLED JIM
FOR ADVICE EVERY WEEK. AS AN ADOPTED MEMBER OF
THE LEVENTIS FAMILY, I LOOKED UP TO JIM, AS
MANY OTHERS DID, AS AN OLDER BROTHER AND
MENTOR. JIM ALWAYS DID WHAT WAS RIGHT. NEVER
HAD TO ASK WAS JIM LEVENTIS GOING TO DO WHAT
WAS RIGHT. AND HE ALWAYS DID WHAT WAS BEST FOR
THE COMMUNITY. MATT KENNELL, HEAD OF THE CITY
CENTER PARTNERSHIP, SAID IT BEST, "JIM HAD HIS
HEART IN JUST ABOUT EVERYTHING THAT HAPPENED IN
THIS COMMUNITY FOR MANY YEARS. HE NEVER
RESTED." NOW THAT SUMS UP JIM LEVENTIS VERY
WELL. THANK YOU.

THE HONORABLE JUDGE LEE: THANK YOU, SIR. NEXT WE
WILL HEAR FROM LT. GOVERNOR HENRY MCMASTER ON
MEMORIES OF JOHN GREGG MCMASTER, JR. THANK
YOU.

LT. GOVERNOR MCMASTER: MAY IT PLEASE THE COURT.

THE HONORABLE JUDGE LEE: YES, SIR.

1	LT. GOVERNOR MCMASTER: LADIES AND GENTLEMEN, JUDGES,
2	PRESIDENT BEDENBAUGH, MADAM CHIEF JUSTICE, IT'S
3	A PLEASURE TO BE HERE AMONG SO MANY SPECIAL
4	PEOPLE. YOU KNOW, MY DADDY ALWAYS TOLD US THAT
5	LAWYERS WERE SPECIAL PEOPLE AND AS I HAVE
6	LISTENED TO THESE MEMORIALS IN THE LAST FEW
7	MINUTES, I THINK THERE'S HARDLY ANYONE HERE
8	THAT COULDN'T BE CONVINCED THAT LAWYERS ARE
9	SPECIAL PEOPLE. DADDY DIED ON FEBRUARY THE
10	20TH, 2015. HE WAS ALMOST 101, JUST THREE
11	WEEKS SHORT. AND AS THE CHIEF JUSTICE SAID IN
12	HER FINAL STATE OF JUDICIARY OR ADDRESS, HE
13	TRIED HIS LAST CASE AT 93 AND WON IT. AND THAT
14	WAS AT AGE 93 NOT 1993. AND THAT MAY BE
15	BECAUSE HE HAD A LIFELONG COMMITMENT TO GOOD
16	HEALTH AND HAD HIS LAST DAY AT THE YMCA DOING
17	RUNNING, DOING PULL-UPS AND PUSH-UPS AND
18	PLAYING BASKETBALL WITH PEOPLE ABOUT A QUARTER
19	OF HIS AGE, WHEN HE WAS 87 YEARS OLD. AND HE
20	ALWAYS RECOMMEND THAT TO US BOYS, SIX OF US,
21	AND NONE OF US HAVE QUITE LIVED UP TO THAT.
22	WHEN HE PASSED AWAY, WE RECEIVED A LOT OF VERY
23	KIND AND GENEROUS CONDOLENCES AND LETTERS AND
24	I SELECTED ONE THAT I THOUGHT I WOULD READ TO
25	YOU THAT IS CAPTURES SOME OF WHAT I WOULD

SAY IF I WERE PREPARING MY OWN REMARKS. AND
THIS COMES FROM A SENIOR MEMBER OF THE BAR,
DAVID FEDOR, WHO IS NOT HERE TODAY. BUT I'LL
READ IT TO YOU. WE RECEIVED THIS SHORTLY AFTER
DADDY PASSED AWAY. IT SAYS, OCCASIONALLY IN
LIFE WE MEET A MAN THAT THAT IS A LEADER OF MEN
AND A FRIEND TO EVERYONE. SUCH A MAN WAS OUR
FRIEND JOHN GREGG MCMASTER. WE ARE NOT HERE TO
MOURN, BUT TO CELEBRATE A LIFE THAT WAS LIVED
IN LAUGHTER, IN JOY AND IN THE LAW. HE WAS A
VERY SUCCESSFUL LAWYER WITH THOUSAND OF CLIENTS
THAT WOULD RELY ONLY ON HIM. HIS FINEST
QUALITIES WERE KNOWN BY ALL THAT KNEW HIM:
INTENSE LOYALTY, DEPENDABILITY, A GREAT MIND, A
WONDERFUL SENSE OF HUMOR, ONE WHO LAUGHED AT
HUMANITY'S SHORTCOMINGS, BUT LOVED US STILL.
YEARS AGO, WHEN I WAS JUST GETTING OUT OF LAW
SCHOOL, I USED TO GO TO THE RICHLAND COUNTY
COURTHOUSE TO SEE HOW REAL LAWYERS TRIED CASES.
I WAS FASCINATED BY AN OLDER LAWYER NAMED JOHN
GREGG MCMASTER. HE HAD ALL THE ABILITY IN THE
WORLD. BUT, IN ADDITION, HE HAD MORE CLASS AND
DIGNITY THAN ANY LAWYER I WATCHED. HE COULD DO
MORE IN A COURTROOM THAN ANYONE. SO I COPIED
ALL HIS MOVES, AS WE DO WITH ANY TOP PERFORMER;

HE BECAME MY IDOL AND MY MENTOR. THE OLD POET
SAID IT BEST, "SEEING GREAT LIVES JUST REMINDS
US WE CAN MAKE OUR LIVES SUBLIME, AND DEPARTING
LEAVE BEHIND US FOOTPRINTS IN THE SANDS OF
TIME." JOHN GREGG, YOU HAVE LEFT US BIG
FOOTPRINTS TO FOLLOW. WE CANNOT FORGET THE
PAIN OF THIS LOSS. BUT, WHEN THE WEATHER IS
WARM AND BEAUTIFUL, WHEN THE SUN SHINES IT'S
BRIGHTEST, WE WILL STILL THINK OF HIM IN ALL
HIS VIGOR. AND, IN THE DARKNESS, WE STILL SEE
THE STARS AND HOW CLEARLY WE WILL SEE HIM.
THERE WAS A SPARK SO SPECIAL IN JOHN GREGG THAT
NOTHING CAN PUT IT OUT. HE MADE US PROUD TO BE
HIS FRIEND. HIS WAS A FULL AND MOST BEAUTIFUL
LIFE. AND HE NEVER LOST A CHANCE TO LEND
ANOTHER A HELPING HAND. JOHN GREGG SAID, "NO
INDIVIDUAL HAS ANY RIGHT TO COME THROUGH THIS
WORLD AND GO OUT WITHOUT LEAVING BEHIND A
LEGITIMATE REASON FOR HAVING PASSED THROUGH
IT." AS SO WAS THE LIFE OF JOHN GREGG. HE,
MORE CLEARLY THAN ANYONE, TAUGHT ME HOW TO BE
A LAWYER. ONE PIECE OF ADVICE HE GAVE ME EARLY
ON WAS, "DAVID, IN COURT, NEVER MISS AN
OPPORTUNITY TO SHUT UP." GRANTLAND RICE, THE
OLD SPORTSWRITER, HIT JOHN GREGG ON THE HEAD.

HE SAID, "FOR WHEN THE GREAT SCORER COMES TO
MARK AGAINST YOUR NAME, HE WRITES NOT THAT YOU
WON OR LOST, BUT HOW YOU PLAYED THE GAME."
JOHN GREGG, NO ONE HAS EVER PLAYED THE GAME OF
LIFE BETTER. SEVERAL YEARS AGO, A YOUNG LAWYER
WHO IS HERE TODAY, BRIAN STERLING, ASKED JOHN
GREGG HOW TO ARGUE A DIFFICULT POINT OF LAW
THAT HE WAS TO ARGUE THE NEXT DAY. JOHN GREGG
SAID, "JUST TELL THE JUDGE SO AND SO." THE
NEXT DAY THE YOUNG LAWYER MADE HIS ARGUMENT.
THE JUDGE LOOKED DOWN AND SAID, "SON, DO YOU
HAVE ANY LEGAL AUTHORITY FOR THAT?" THE YOUNG
MAN REPLIED, "YES, SIR, JOHN GREGG MCMCASTER."
THE JUDGE LOOKED DOWN AND SAID, "THAT'S GOOD
ENOUGH FOR ME." AND, JOHN GREGG, YOUR LIFE AND
EXAMPLE HAS BEEN GOOD ENOUGH FOR OUR LIVES
FOREVER. I KNOW THE THINGS YOU BELIEVE IN MADE
YOU THE PERSON YOU ARE. AND JOHN GREGG
BELIEVED IN THE GOODNESS OF EVERY PERSON. HE
MADE EVERYONE HE MET FEEL HAPPY TO BE WITH HIM
BY MAKING THEM FEEL SPECIAL. SHARE WITH ME A
MOMENT AS WE IMAGINE A LETTER ONLY JOHN GREGG
WOULD HAVE WRITTEN TO US ALL IF HE HAD HAD THE
TIME. "DEAR FAMILY AND FRIENDS, I ASK ALL OF
YOU TO LIVE LIFE FULLY EVERY DAY OF YOUR LIFE.

I ASK EACH OF YOU TO BE GENTLE AND KIND TO EACH
OTHER, TO GIVE HELP WHEN IT IS NEEDED, TO LAUGH
LOUDLY AND OFTEN, TO SEE THE FOOLISHNESS OF
WORRY AND THE JOY OF LOVE. AND, MOST OF ALL,
REMEMBER, LIFE IS A SHORT TRIP AT BEST, SO LOVE
EVERY MINUTE OF IT." WE HAVE IT ON EVIDENCE IN
THE BIBLE THAT LAUGHTER IS ALLOWED IN HEAVEN.
HOW MUCH MORE THERE WILL BE NOW THAT JOHN GREGG
HAS MOVED UPSTAIRS. I HOPE THE ANGELS CAN
STAND THE NOISE OF THE LAUGHTER, BUT IN MY
HEART, I KNOW THEY WILL LOVE IT. WE'RE ALL
GOING TO MISS HIM, BUT I'M SURE HE IS JUST
WARMING UP HIS AUDIENCE IN HEAVEN FOR THE REST
OF US. SIR WINSTON CHURCHILL SAID IT BEST AND
IT FITS JOHN GREGG WELL. HE SAID, "I AM READY
TO MEET MY MAKER. WHETHER MY MAKER IS PREPARED
FOR THE GREAT ORDEAL OF MEETING ME IS ANOTHER
MATTER." SO, JOHN GREGG, FROM ALL YOUR MANY
FRIENDS DOWN HERE, WE SAY, UNTIL WE MEET AGAIN.
YOU HAVE BEEN OUR FRIEND, OUR MENTOR AND OUR
GUIDE. AND, THANKS FOR THE BEAUTIFUL MEMORIES.
HE WILL BE REMEMBERED AS ONE OF THE GREATEST OF
HIS RACE - THE HUMAN RACE. AND THAT'S FROM
DAVID FEDOR. ON BEHALF OF OUR FAMILY WE WANT
TO THANK ALL OF YOU FOR BEING HERE.

THE HONORABLE JUDGE LEE: THANK YOU, LT. GOVERNOR.

NEXT WE WILL REMEMBER EDMUND HEYWARD MONTEITH

MR. BERRY: MAY IT PLEASE THE COURT.

THE HONORABLE JUDGE LEE: YES, SIR.

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MR. BERRY: I WANT Y'ALL TO KNOW THAT I CONSIDER IT A REAL PRIVILEGE BEING ALLOWED THE OPPORTUNITY TO GIVE THIS MEMORIAL TRIBUTE. TO MY DEAR FRIEND EDMUND HEYWARD MONTEITH, WHO WAS BORN ON JUNE THE 4TH 1930 IN COLUMBIA AND DIED DECEMBER 27TH, 2015 IN HIS HOME IN BLYTHEWOOD. HE WAS THE SON OF THE LATE COLON S. MONTEITH, JR., WHO WAS A WELL KNOWN ATTORNEY HERE IN COLUMBIA AND THE LATE EILEEN BOSTICK MONTEITH. IS SURVIVED BY HIS DEVOTED WIFE OF 31 YEARS, ADELE; AND HIS DAUGHTERS, HAZEL MONTEITH CARTER; FRANCIS MONTEITH WHATLEY AND SHE LIVES IN MARIETTA, GEORGIA; A SON EDMUND JR., OF CAPE CARTERET, NORTH CAROLINA; AND A BROTHER, COLON S. MONTEITH, III OF ATLANTA, GEORGIA; A SISTER AILEEN OF FAYETTEVILLE, ALABAMA. HE WAS ALSO SURVIVED BY TWO STEP DAUGHTERS, CELESTE WHITLEY OF ATLANTA AND JAOUELINE NEWMAN OF JACKSONVILLE, AS WELL AS 12 GRAND-CHILDREN, THREE GREAT GRAND-CHILDREN AND MANY

NEPHEWS, COUSINS AND FRIENDS. EDMUND ATTENDED
THE COLUMBIA PUBLIC SCHOOLS. GRADUATED FROM
DREHER HIGH SCHOOL IN 1947, WHERE HE WAS AN
OUTSTANDING GUARD ON DREHER'S FIRST FOOTBALL
TEAM. AND LET ME TELL YOU I PLAYED CENTER NEXT
TO HIM AND I WEIGHED 160 POUNDS AND IT MADE
EDMUND LOOK LIKE A MIDGET. HE SAVED ME A LOT
OF TIMES WHEN I WAS CENTER, WE PLAYED ON A
SINGLE WING. I DON'T KNOW HOW MANY OF Y'ALL
KNOW WHAT A SINGLE WING IS BUT THAT'S WHEN YOU
GOT YOUR HEAD BETWEEN YOUR LEGS AND YOU DON'T
KNOW WHAT THE GUY IN FRONT OF YOU IS GOING TO
DO TO YOU. HE GRADUATED FROM THE UNIVERSITY OF
SOUTH CAROLINA WITH A BACHELOR OF SCIENCE
DEGREE IN BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION AND BACHELOR
IN LAW DEGREE. IN 1952 EDMUND WAS ADMITTED TO
THE SOUTH CAROLINA BAR. IN 1953 HE JOINED THE
MONTEITH LAW FIRM, WHICH WAS STARTED BY HIS
GREAT GREAT GRAND-FATHER. HE RETIRED FROM THAT
LAW PRACTICE IN 1995 AS THE LAST SURVIVING
MEMBER OF THE MONTEITH LAW FIRM. THIS ENDING
ONE OF THE LONGEST STANDING FAMILY LAW FIRMS IN
SOUTH CAROLINA. EDMUND WAS ELECTED TO THE
SOUTH CAROLINA HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES FOR
RICHLAND COUNTY IN 1958 AND WAS THE YOUNGEST

1	MEMBER TO BE ELECTED AT THAT TIME. THROUGH HIS
2	VERY ACTIVE LEGAL CAREER HE SERVED AS THE
3	ASSISTANT SOLICITOR FOR THE 5TH JUDICIAL
4	CIRCUIT. THIS WAS A PART-TIME POSITION UNDER
5	THE THEN SOLICITOR JOHN FORD. THE MONTEITH LAW
6	FIRM ENJOYED AN EXTENSIVE LAW PRACTICE WITH
7	EDMUND EXCELLING IN FAMILY LAW. HE WAS AN
8	ACTIVE MEMBER OF THE AMERICAN ACADEMY OF
9	MATRIMONY OF LAWYERS WHILE MANAGING HIS
10	EXTENSIVE LEGAL WORK. HE FOUND TIME TO SERVE
11	MANY YEARS WITH THE SOUTH CAROLINA NATIONAL
12	GUARD ACHIEVING THE RANK OF A BIRD COLONEL
13	BEFORE HE RETIRED. ALWAYS ACTIVE BEYOND HIS
14	LEGAL CAREER, EDMUND WAS A VALUED MEMBER OF THE
15	BLYTHEWOOD MASONIC LODGE, THE MASTER MASON OF
16	THE GRAND LODGE OF SOUTH CAROLINA, MORE
17	IMPORTANTLY HE WAS EXTREMELY ACTIVE BOTH
18	PHYSICALLY AND FINANCIALLY IN THE TRINITY
19	UNITED METHODIST CHURCH IN BLYTHEWOOD. AND
20	THROUGHOUT THE YEARS HE SERVED IN MANY
21	CAPACITIES, INCLUDING THE DICONIC CHAIR, SUNDAY
22	SCHOOL TEACHER, AND CHOIR. JUST TO MENTION A
23	FEW THINGS HE DID, HE WAS VERY, VERY ACTIVE.
24	HE ALSO MADE SEVERAL TRIPS TO SRI LANKA WHERE
25	HE NOT ONLY SHARED HIS FAITH IN GOD BUT ALSO

1	WORKED WITH THE FARMERS TO IMPROVE THEIR
2	AGRICULTURAL AND IRRIGATION SKILLS. AFTER
3	RETIRING HE BECAME VERY ADEPT IN GROWING PLANTS
4	IN AND AROUND HIS GREENHOUSE IN BLYTHEWOOD.
5	SOME OF WHICH HE WOULD SELL, SOME OF WHICH HE
6	WOULD GRACIOUSLY GIVE TO FAMILY AND FREINDS.
7	I WAS A RECIPIENT OF HIS GIFTS AND 25 YEARS
8	LATER, THEY'RE STILL BEAUTIFULLY LIVING, IN
9	SPITE OF THE GARDENER. IF I WERE TO DESCRIBE
10	EDMUND MONTEITH AS A PERSON, I WOULD TELL YOU
11	THAT HE WAS AN UNASSUMING MAN, WHO WAS EQUALLY
12	AT HOME WITH THOSE UNFORTUNATE MEMBERS OF OUR
13	SOCIETY AS HE WAS WITH THE RICH AND THE FAMOUS.
14	I WOULD TELL YOU THAT HE GAVE HIS TALENT, TIME,
15	AND TREASURE TO BENEFIT HIS COMMUNITY AND THOSE
16	LESS FORTUNATE THAN HE. I WOULD TELL YOU THAT
17	HE IS A CARING AND COMPASSIONATE PERSON WITH
18	LOVE IN HIS HEART FOR THE FELLOW MAN. I SPENT
19	MANY HOURS WITH EDMUND OVER THE PAST 69 YEARS,
20	AND NEVER ONCE DID HE IN ANY WAY HAVE AN UNKIND
21	WORD ABOUT ANY PERSON, REGARDLESS OF THE
22	CIRCUMSTANCES. I WOULD TELL YOU ADELE, HIS
23	BEST FRIEND AND DEVOTED PARTNER WAS THE LOVE OF
24	HIS LIFE. I WOULD TELL YOU THAT HIS DEARLY
25	LOVED CHILDREN AND STEP-CHILDREN, THEIR SPOUSES

GRAND-CHILDREN. ΗE WAS UNASHAMENDLY AND HIS I WOULD TELL YOU PROUD OF EACH ONE OF THEM. THAT THE LIVES OF THOSE OF US WHO KNEW EDMUND ENRICHED WERE **BECAUSE** OF HIS MONTEITH I WOULD TELL YOU THAT HE IS MISSED FELLOWHSIP. HOWEVER, WE CAN REJOICE IN THE FACT BY ALL. THAT HE IS WITH OUR LORD AND CREATOR WHERE HE WILL ENJOY ETERNAL LIFE. MAY GOD BLESS US ALL. THANK YOU.

THE HONORABLE JUDGE LEE: THANK YOU, MR. BERRY. NOW
WE RECOGNIZE JULIAN NEXSEN BY JOHN SOWARDS.

MR. SOWARDS: THANK YOU. MAY IT PLEASE THE COURT.

THE HONORABLE JUDGE LEE: YES, SIR.

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MR. **SOWARDS:** MADAM CHIEF JUSTICE, YOUR HONOR, THE BAR, FRIENDS, FAMILY AND MEMBER OF IT IS A PRIVILEGE AND AN HONOR TO COLLEAGUES. SHARE WITH YOU COMMENTS ON THE LIFE OF JULIAN IN THE BRIEF TIME ALLOWED, J. NEXSEN. STRUGGLED WITH WHAT WORDS TO USE THAT WOULD ADEOUATELY DEPICT JULIAN NEXSEN. I'VE CHOSEN TO SIMPLY TELL YOU THAT THE BEST DESCRIPTION OF JULIAN IS HE WAS PROFOUNDLY GOOD AT LITERALLY EVERYTHING HE DID. HE WAS A PROFOUNDLY GOOD HUSBAND, TO HIS BELOVED SPOUSE, BETTY, WHO PRE-DECEASED MIHBYMANY YEARS. HEWAS Α

1	PROFOUNDLY GOOD FATHER TO HIS SON JAY AND
2	DAUGHTER IVEY, WHO ARE PRESENT HERE TODAY. HE
3	WAS A PROFOUNDLY GOOD GRANDFATHER TO HIS MANY
4	GRANDCHILDREN. TO THOSE THAT WERE LUCKY TO
5	LIVE NEAR HIM, HE WAS A PROFOUNDLY GOOD
6	NEIGHBOR AND MEMBER OF HIS COMMUNITY, WHICH WAS
7	COLUMBIA AT LARGE, KINGSTREE AND PAWLY'S
8	ISLAND. HE WAS A PROFOUNDLY GOOD MEMBER OF HIS
9	CHURCH, EAST MINISTER PRESBYTERIAN AND SERVED
10	THE PRESBYTERY IN PROFOUND WAYS THROUGHOUT HIS
11	ENTIRE LIFE. HE WAS A PROFOUNDLY GOOD STUDENT,
12	EARNING PHI BETA KAPPA DISTINCTION FROM HIS
13	UNDERGRADUATE DAYS AND GRADUATING FIRST IN HIS
14	LAW SCHOOL CLASS AT USC. HE WAS A PROFOUNDLY
15	GOOD SOLDIER SERVING ON THE BATTLEFIELDS OF
16	EUROPE DURING WORLD WAR II AS A COMBAT INFANTRY
17	PLATOON LEADER AND COMPANY COMMANDER AND THEN
18	LATER IN KOREA. DURING WORLD WAR II HIS
19	SERVICE WAS AWARDED WITH A BRONZE STAR. AND
20	YES, HE WAS A PROFOUNDLY GOOD LAWYER. AND IN
21	HIS PROFESSIONAL CAREER THAT SPANNED NEARLY
22	SEVEN DECADES, HE'S LEFT A LEGACY THAT IS HARD
23	TO FULLY APPRECIATE. AT HIS CORE, JULIAN
24	NEXSEN WAS THE PENULTIMATE PROFESSIONAL. WITH
25	HIS HALLMARK CIVILITY AND PROFESSIONAL

1	DEMEANOR, HE WAS THE PERFECT ROLE MODEL FOR HOW
2	ALL LAWYERS SHOULD COMPORT THEMSELVES. IN
3	FACT, JUSTICE TOAL, IN LIEU OF OUR CIVILITY
4	OATH, YOU SIMPLY COULD HAVE ISSUED A THREE WORD
5	ORDER, "ACT LIKE JULIAN," AND THAT WOULD HAVE
6	BEEN SUFFICIENT. HIS CALM DEMEANOR AND GENTILE
7	WAYS ARE LEGENDARY IN OUR ORGANIZATION AND AT
8	THE BAR. HE LED BY EXAMPLE AND MADE YOU BETTER
9	JUST BY VIRTUE OF HIS PRESENCE. HIS EXAMPLE
10	DEMANDED THAT YOU ELEVATE YOUR CONDUCT. HIS
11	DRESS WAS IMPECCABLE. SO MUCH SO THAT IT WAS
12	YEARS BEFORE I REALIZED THAT A VEST IS NOT
13	REQUIRED AS PART OF A BUSINESS SUIT. HE NEVER
14	RAISED HIS VOICE OR USED INAPPROPRIATE
15	LANGUAGE, MUCH LESS VULGARITY. IMAGINE THAT,
16	A LAWYER THAT DOES NOT SHOUT OR USE PROFANITY.
17	LAST, JULIAN NEXSEN WAS A PROFOUNDLY GOOD
18	PERSON. WITH AN IMPECCABLE CHARACTER AND BY
19	TREATING EVERYONE WITH RESPECT, JULIAN CREATED
20	AN AURA OF DIGNITY THAT IS SORELY MISSED IN OUR
21	WORLD TODAY. I HAD THE GREAT FORTUNE OF
22	MEETING JULIAN EARLY IN MY CAREER AND ACTUALLY
23	AT THE VERY BEGINNING OF MY LEGAL EDUCATION.
24	I HAD THE GREAT FORTUNE OF HIS ROLE MODEL TO
25	GIVE ME AN EXAMPLE FROM EARLY ON. OUR FIRM,

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WHICH PROUDLY BEARS HIS NAME IS ALL THE BETTER
FOR HIS LONG PRESENCE. WE STILL RESEMBLE HIM,
I FERVENTLY HOPE. AS I RECALL JULIAN, I CANNOT
HELP BUT REMEMBER MY FIRST ENCOUNTER. PLEASE
INDULGE ME THIS SHORT STORY. AT THE TIME I
STARTED LAW SCHOOL IN AUGUST OF 1979, MY WIFE
BEGAN AS A LEGAL SECRETARY AT NEXSEN PRUET
JACOBS AND POLLARD. AND YES, THAT'S HOW I GOT
MY JOB. JULIAN WAS MORE INTERESTED IN
RETAINING MY WIFE THAN HE WAS IN HIRING ME, I
PROMISE. AT THE END OF THE DAY, I WOULD WALK
TO THE FIRM'S OFFICES AND WAIT IN THE LOBBY FOR
